Set among the beautiful gardens of Turlough Park House in Co. Mayo, the Museum is home to Ireland's Folklife Collection. Immerse yourself in this rich collection of artefacts that celebrate the diversity of everyday life in Ireland, from country and village to town and city. Spread over four floors, the Museum at Turlough Park tells stories that are both familiar and surprising.




The National Museum at Turlough Park is set among 30 acres of lush woods, park and gardens. The Museum Collections and galleries are housed in contemporary buildings designed in 2001, by the Office of Public Works. The site also features a Victorian Gothic house built in 1865 with outbuildings, ornamental glasshouses, terraces to a lake and a newly built playground. Enjoy the calmness of our Museum, a nature walk and afterwards a visit to our shop and cafe.




