Welcome to the National Museum of Ireland at Kildare Street

Located in an ornate neoclassical complex in Dublin's city centre, the Museum houses Ireland's Archaeology Collection. Explore our oldest artefacts, including a stunning trove of ancient gold and uncover the fascinating stories of our ancestors. Learn about the archaeology of the peoples who lived in Ireland in the past, including Prehistoric, Viking and early Christian.



The National Museum at Kildare Street opened originally as the Dublin Museum of Science and Art in 1890. Designed in a grand Victorian Palladian style, it's known for its striking Irish marble columns, domed Rotunda and mosaic floors. Here, Ireland's rich history meets stunning architecture, ready for you to explore.



The Museum plays a vital role in collecting, curating, preserving, and showcasing some of the world's finest collections related to Ireland's rich heritage. Our work extends beyond our galleries, engaging with diverse communities near and far, as well as with schools, families, researchers and international visitors.

We host events, workshops, and activities year-round that celebrate our Collections and culture. Whether exploring with an activity trail, attending talks, or participating in workshops, there is something for everyone. 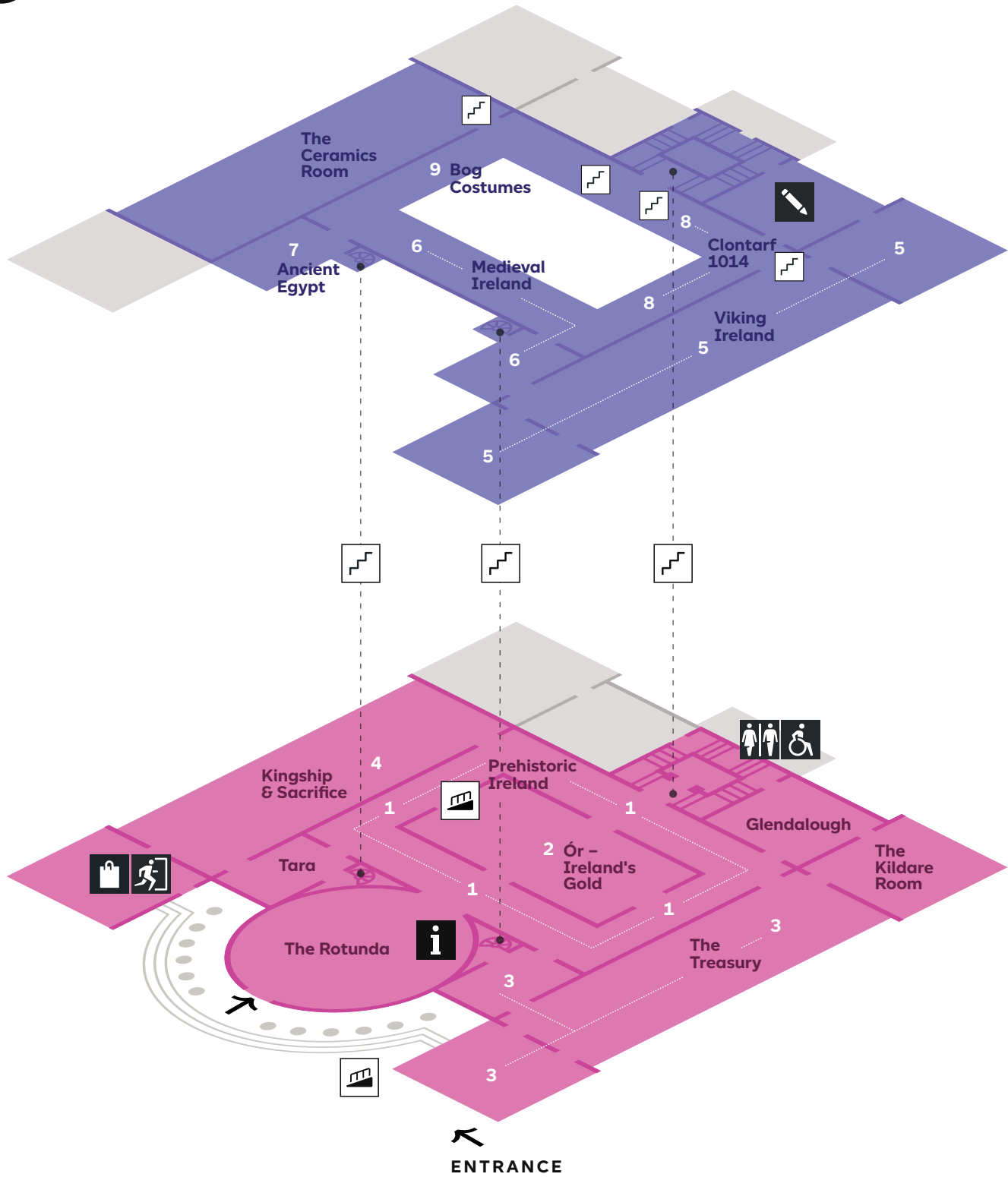

The Rotunda
A striking architectural feature, showcasing Neo-classical influences. Its grand domed structure, rising 20 metres high, is inspired by the Pantheon in Rome. Inside, classical marble columns, sourced from counties Cork, Kilkenny, Galway, Limerick and Armagh.



Mosaics
The historic mosaic floor of the Rotunda portrays the signs of the zodiac and was designed by Ludwig Oppenheimer Limited. These mosaics can be seen throughout the Museum building with motifs that recall the civilisations of ancient Greece and Rome.
